Years 1 & 2



On the ball

In P.E this week, Years 1 and 2 put their reflexes to the test and practised their skills of invasion, as they took part in a Bee Netball taster lesson. The pupils had lots of fun participating in the focussed and progressive activities. They enjoyed picking up little hints about the game, such as the 4 second rule, standing still with the ball and making a 'W' with their hands when using a chest pass. The pupils have also thrown themselves into preparing for our forthcoming Class Assembly. Alongside our normal lessons, the children have been learning two songs, a poem and producing some secret writing. Mrs Wood is particularly impressed with the enthusiasm, excitement and commitment all the children are showing; well done!





Years 3 & 4

Recycling Egyptians!

'Tut' as we now call him (that's Tutankhamun to you) has had a spring clean from Years 3 and 4! The children are continuing with the Egyptian theme within their studies and were very pleased when Mr Hilton reminded them that a previous Year 3 had made a Tutankhamun death mask. The pupils have resurrected him and have done a super job of sprucing him up to use in the display we're working on!



Year 5



They then copied out their highlighted words and arranged them into stanzas, to create their free verse poem. Finally, in week 3, they completed the final redrafting of their poems, before presenting them in the style of Michael Rosen. The poems are excellent reads, full of excitement and drama. I think most people will have a memory that they can relate to. Come and have a read!

Poetic presentation

Year 5 completed their free verse poems this week and enjoyed presenting them in their choice of manner. The poems were the result of a 3 week project. In week 1, they remembered a real life experience that made them excited, worried or anxious. They took these ideas and planned, then wrote, a prose (narrative) based on their experience. In week 2 they highlighted key phrases and words that added lots of imagery and visualisation for the reader.





Year 6

Ray of light

Year 6 have been exploring and extending their knowledge of shape in Maths. They started by identifying and measuring irregular shapes and circles. They then moved onto the translation and rotation of shapes on a grid, plotting and reading coordinates as they went. In Art, the pupils have been using scratch art to explore their latest piece by artist Paul Klee. The general consensus amongst the group was that the painting represented woodland animals hidden within the trees at night. The children traced the image and started to etch away, revealing foxes, owls and many more creatures hiding in the darkness!





In Science, Year 6 have been experimenting with light. After learning that light can only travel in straight lines, we investigated how light can change direction. Firstly, we looked at refraction. As the light rays hit water, which is more dense than air, it causes the rays to slow down and the light changes direction. Some images become magnified through water and others completely disappear! Next, we looked at reflection. We discussed how rough and shiny surfaces scatter and reflect light, and looked deeply into the angles of incident and reflected rays. We then used this knowledge to make periscopes!

Stay and Play

Henri Matisse's 'The Snail' was our inspiration in the Art session of Stay and Play this week. Towards the end of his career Matisse would get his students to tear paper, which he then used to create his pictures. His most famous collage is 'The Snail'. The children followed in his footsteps and no scissors were used as they tore pieces to create their own snail pictures.





Activities

Canal capers

With the weather back on our side this week, our intrepid adventure sports group were back on the water in their Canadian Canoes. In two teams, the pupils completed an aquatic treasure hunt, solving clues and paddling their way to the answers. Both teams got all the clues but the winning team - Mr White's boat - were accused of being a little 'over resourceful' by asking a member of the public for help with one of their answers!





Modern Foreign Languages

Year 5 and 6 have been practicing their Spanish conversation with a game of Batalla Naval, or Battleships. The pupils had to create sentences using opinions and school subjects to search for their enemy's hidden pencils, rulers and rubbers. They got quite competitive, spoke plenty of Spanish and enjoyed a Spanish twist on a classic game!
