








New term, new topics

Art

Archimboldo antics

In their Art class this week, Reception Class looked at the artist Archimboldo, who created pictures using objects like fruits and vegetables, as well as pots and pans. The children had a go at recreating this style, firstly by using fruits and vegetables and then later during our visit to the beach.





Phonics



Al fresco phonics

Reception Class took their phonics learning outside this week, using the playground markings to identify sounds and think of words with that sound in them. At the beach, we played phonics bingo by throwing stones onto a sound grid and identifying the sounds. Lexi made herself a pen from a long piece of grass and wrote her name and some words in the sand.

Geography & Humanities

Naturally inquisitive

During their trip to the beach on Friday, Reception thought about the things we could see that we don't find in our garden. The children quickly identified the sea, sand, rocks, cliffs and seaweed. Kaia said we can get sand in the garden - in a sandpit - so we talked about features in the environment that occur naturally, like sand on the beach, and features we put in gardens that are not natural, like a sand pit.







Year 4 have also been busy with Humanities this week, not to mention double English and Maths too. The children really hit the ground running and it was lovely to see them all back after the holidays and we enjoyed having a buzzing, vibrant classroom again! Year 4 also enjoyed welcoming Piper back into the class this week; we really missed her last term!




Maths

Shopping skills and data conversion

This week in Maths, the Year 5 pupils practised their rounding skills, to mentally add two amounts of money together with two decimal places. It took a few goes to remember to add or take away the extra penny but they all persevered towards the end of the week. This is a great skill to take to the shops and the children have been encouraged to estimate their total before making payment, to ensure they get charged the correct amount.





In their Maths lessons, Years 6 and 7 have been learning how to read and convert the data in line graphs and pie charts. They also continue their SATs preparations.


Science

Changing shapes and reproducing plants

Year 2 and 3's Science focus this term will be on changing shape. We have had lots of fun modelling dough into various shapes, before exploring different materials and thinking about how to change the shape of each one. Some interesting ideas were suggested, which we will explore further during the term. We also inspected the growth of our potatoes, which the class feel will produce more harvest than the other classes! The children were all happy to return to school after a lovely sunny Easter break, eager to share their news and write about their holidays.







Year 5's new Science topic is 'Living Things and Their Habitats'. We have launched our studies by looking at plants and how they reproduce. This first week involved a mixture of fact finding, problem solving and investigating. Keep your eyes peeled for some in depth studies coming soon, particularly focusing on practical work.



English

Voyage into mythology

In English, Year 1 have begun their literary voyage through Greek Mythology, with Odysseus as their guide! We have read the myth of the Trojan Horse and discussed Odysseus' heroic acts and how he used both brains and brawn to solve the problems in this story. The children have retold the tale through storyboards, reminding themselves how to use notes and speech bubbles for planning stories.



Music



Warming up

In Music this week, the children did a musical warm up with a difference for hymn practise, it involved remembering a series of sequences as well as the words!

RNLI Assembly

Seaside safety

On Thursday, the children enjoyed a colourful, lively, engaging and informative assembly from the RNLI. They were reminded about how to stay safe in the sea and the sun, and how to get help by signalling to lifeguards on the beach to call for the coastguard. The children were lucky enough to role play some emergency scenarios, demonstrating some of the equipment and strategies used by the lifeguards to rescue beach users.





How to stay safe on your Summer beach days:

- Find a safe place to swim between the red and yellow flags.
- Stay in waist depth, where your feet can always touch the ground.
- If you find yourself in trouble, wave one arm above your head and call for help to get the attention of the lifeguards.
- Wear sun cream and a hat in the sun.
- If you see anyone in trouble, find a lifeguard or call for the coastguard on 999 or 112.
